

COMMONWEALTH SECRETARIAT ARBITRAL TRIBUNAL

COMPOSITION

The Tribunal is composed of eight Members, all of whom must be nationals of different Commonwealth States. In accordance with Article IV.3 of the Tribunal's Statute, the Tribunal's Members 'shall be of high moral character and must: (a) have held, hold or be qualified to hold high judicial office in a Commonwealth country; or (b) be jurisconsults of recognised competence with experience as such for a period of not less than ten years.' The Tribunal's President and Judges are selected by the Board of Governors of the Commonwealth Secretariat on a regionally representative and gender-balanced basis, and serve up to two, consecutive, four-year terms. The Tribunal is governed by its Statute and Rules, and in accordance with Article XII.1 of the Tribunal's Statute, in cases relating to a contract of service, is 'bound by the principles of international administrative law which shall apply to the exclusion of the national laws of individual member countries' of the Commonwealth. Presently one Member of the Tribunal is pending appointment.

K.S.P. Radhakrishnan (India)	
	K.S.P. Radhakrishnan was a Judge of the Supreme Court of India, from 2009 to 2014. Between 2006 and 2009 he was successively Chief Justice at the High Courts of Kerala, Jammu and Kashmir, and Gujarat. Following his retirement from the bench, from 2014 to 2019 he was Chairman of the Supreme Court of India Road Safety Committee. President Radhakrishnan is a member of the Singapore International Arbitration Centre, life member of the International Centre for Alternate Dispute Resolution Centre (New Delhi) and member of the Delhi International Arbitration Centre. President Radhakrishnan has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since June 2019 and President since August 2026.

Judges

Judith Levine (Australia)



Judith Levine is an independent arbitrator with extensive dispute resolution experience in public international law, investor-state, and contract disputes. Judge Levine has sat as presiding, sole arbitrator, and co-arbitrator in cases administered by the Permanent Court of Arbitration, International Chamber of Commerce, Singapore International Arbitration Centre, Hong Kong International Arbitration Centre, Korean Commercial Arbitration Board, and the Court of Arbitration for Sport. Judge Levine is a Vice-President of the Australian Centre for International Commercial Arbitration and a Senior Member of the New South Wales Civil and Administrative Tribunal. She is formerly Senior Legal Counsel at the Permanent Court of Arbitration in The Hague. Prior to this, Judge Levine practised at White & Case in New York and also served with the International Court of Justice, the Australian Attorney-General, and the High Court of Australia. Judge Levine was educated at New York University and the University of New South Wales. Judge Levine has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since June 2020.

Sir Salamo Injia (Papua New Guinea)



Sir Salamo Injia is former Chief Justice of Papua New Guinea. He was knighted in 2006. Judge Injia was educated at the University of Papua New Guinea and Harvard Law School. He was admitted to the Bar in 1982 and joined the Public Solicitor's Office as a public defender, rising to Deputy Public Solicitor (Civil Litigation). From 1990 Judge Injia practiced privately and was an Acting Judge of the National Court. From 1994 until his retirement in 2018, Judge Injia was a fulltime Judge of the National Court and for a ten-year term, the Supreme Court. Judge Injia held a series of appointments as a Senior Resident Judge and Deputy Chief Justice, before becoming Chief Justice in 2008. He has written and published extensively on a wide range of aspects of the law and is also actively involved in legal education in Papua New Guinea. He was chair of the Royal Commission of Inquiry into the State's UBS Loan (between 2019 and 2022). Judge Injia has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since June 2020.

Carol Roberts (Canada)

Carol Roberts has been a Judicial Justice with the Provincial Court of British Columbia since 2008. She has worked in the area of dispute resolution since 1992, acting as a mediator and arbitrator in a broad variety of areas including employment, human rights, sports, property assessment, personal injury and workers compensation. A Member of the Canadian Association of Distinguished Neutrals, Judge Roberts is currently a mediator and arbitrator for the Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada and the Court of Arbitration for Sport. She is also on the International Panel for Sport Resolutions, United Kingdom. Judge Roberts has been a Member of the Employment Standards Tribunal in British Columbia since 1992 and is an arbitrator and referee under the Canada Labour Code. She was an adjudicator with the Indian Residential School Adjudication Secretariat for over 10 years, is a domestic and international panel member with the Vancouver International Arbitration Centre and a panel member with the British Virgin Islands International Arbitration Centre. Judge Roberts has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since June 2022.

Habibu Idris Shall (Nigeria)

Habibu Idris Shall was a Judge of the High Court of Justice, Bauchi State, from 2004 to 2018. Between 1986 and 1997 he was successively State Counsel and Senior State Counsel, and from 1997 to 1999 was Deputy Director of Civil Litigation. From 1999 to 2004, Judge Shall was Solicitor General and Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Justice. He has also held numerous other offices, as member, secretary and chair of public and governmental committees and task-forces. Judge Shall was educated at the University of Maiduguri and Nigerian Law School, Lagos. Following retirement, Judge Shall chaired the Judicial Commission of Inquiry to Investigate Human Rights Abuses of the Special Anti-Robbery Squad and Other Units of the Nigerian Police Force in Bauchi State. Judge Shall has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since February 2024.

Sir Tim Eicke (United Kingdom)

Sir Tim Eicke is a barrister and arbitrator practicing from Essex Court Chambers in London. He was knighted in 2026. From September 2016 to September 2025, Judge Eicke was a Judge at the European Court of Human Rights, nominated by the United Kingdom. He was called to the Bar of England and Wales in 1993 (and Northern Ireland in 2025) and appointed QC (now KC) in 2011. Judge Eicke was educated in English, Scottish and German law at the Universities of Passau and Dundee. In 2017, he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate (LLD (h.c.)) by the University of Dundee. Judge Eicke has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since June 2026.

Thokozani Agnes Patemba (Malawi)

Thokozani Agnes Patemba has been a Judge of the High Court of Malawi since 2020. Judge Patemba has served as Registrar of the Malawi Judiciary, from 2017 to 2020, Chief Magistrate of the Eastern Region of Malawi, between 2015 and 2017, Assistant Registrar to the Supreme Court of Appeal, from 2012 to 2015, Assistant Registrar to the Industrial Relations Court, between 2009 and 2012, and Magistrate and Assistant Registrar for the High Court in Mzuzu, from 2004 to 2009. On secondment, Judge Patemba served as Deputy High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, between 2021 and 2026, during which time she served on the Legal Committee of the International Maritime Organization. She has been a Visiting Lecturer at Mzuzu University and Malawi College of Accountability. She was educated at the University of Malawi, University of Zimbabwe and Queen Mary University of London. Judge Patemba has been a Member of the Commonwealth Secretariat Arbitral Tribunal since June 2026.

Peter Quayle is an international lawyer and solicitor-advocate of England and Wales. He is Senior Strategic Advisor, Multilateral Governance to Strategy&PwC, Public International Law Panel Counsel to the UK Attorney General, External Ethics Advisor to the Ethics Committee of the Boards of Directors of the African Development Bank Group, and Member of the Panel of Independent Reviewers of the New Development Bank.
