

SUMMARY OF THE WORKING OF THE PLAN
FOR THE PERIOD 1978-1979

AUSTRALIA

No significant changes have been made to the administration of CSFP in Australia over the reporting period.

The Department of Education continues to look after the nomination of Australians to study in other countries and the administration of scholars from developed Commonwealth countries who are brought here to study, while the Australian Development Assistance Bureau of the Department of Foreign Affairs is responsible for scholars nominated for study in Australia by developing countries. Both aspects have functioned smoothly during the period under review. Australia does accept nominations for undergraduate study from some countries under CSFP. This is done where it is known that a developing country's most urgent manpower needs are for persons with under- rather than post-graduate qualifications.

THE BAHAMAS

There has been no change in the machinery set up for the administration of the Plan in the Bahamas.

The calibre of applicants for awards continues to improve and it is gratifying to note a steady increase in the percentage of those interested in research or studies leading to the Doctorate degree.

Canada and the United Kingdom continue to attract a sizeable proportion of our candidates but, by and large, there is growing interest in awards tenable in any of the Commonwealth countries.

Two awards have been granted for 1979 and two were extended for the period 1978/79.

Recent graduates are all contributing to the further development of the country in their respective specialities.

BANGLADESH

On receipt of offers from Commonwealth countries, an exercise is undertaken to determine fields and priorities for the utilization of these offers. This is done keeping in view the normal manpower requirements of Bangladesh as well as facilities already offered to various institutions. Once this is done, applications are invited from candidates through the press and other mass communications media. Applications, when received, are initially scrutinized and those who on paper appear to have highly satisfactory academic records of a certain standard are called for interview by a Selection Board which includes experts in the relevant fields and men of eminence. The recommendations of

this Committee are examined by a high level Selection Committee, usually presided over by the Honourable Minister/Adviser in Charge of the Education Ministry and nominations are finalised.

There has been no change in the machinery set up for the administration of the Plan in Bangladesh during the period under report. It has not been possible for Bangladesh to take up any scheme for award of scholarships to the nationals of other Commonwealth countries for study in Bangladesh. Bangladesh has not faced any major problems in the operation of the plan as a nominating country.

Most of the scholars usually return to the country after completion of their studies and rejoin their universities/institutions. Steps are being taken to prevent brain drain as far as possible.

No official report on the operation of the plan has so far been published in Bangladesh.

We feel that the majority of awards should cover the minimum period required for a master's course, but this should not be made into a rigid rule and there should be room for doctoral studies in exceptional cases. We would like to see the offers for under-graduate studies equally emphasised. The offers may be utilized in greater number in the fields of science and technology rather than in any other fields.

BARBADOS

There has been no change in the administrative machinery of the Plan during the period under review. The Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Education and Culture continues to advertise offers of awards as they are made available. Applicants are interviewed by the National Scholarships Committee which makes its recommendations for the Minister's consideration.

It is hoped that more awards could be made available at the under-graduate level in some of the areas of study not available at regional institutions e.g. Pharmacy, Dentistry, Veterinary Science.

There are no proposals for an official report on the operation of the Plan.

BRITAIN

The Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in the United Kingdom, under the chairmanship of Sir Michael Walker, GCMG, continued to be the official agency of the Plan in Britain. The Association of Commonwealth Universities provides the secretariat, the Joint Secretaries of the Commission being Sir Hugh W. Springer, KCMG, CBE and Mr. E.E. Temple.

The competition for scholarships tenable in Britain still dominates the yearly cycle of work. A further year's experience has only shown that we cannot over-emphasise the importance of our receiving nominations and all the accompanying documents, including references, by the official closing date. It is of the essence of the competition that all applications should be

considered together. It becomes increasingly difficult - and in some cases impossible - to place people in universities after Easter. As more and more British universities demand the passing of a test in English in the home country before confirming the acceptance of candidates whose native language is not English, the arrangement of places necessarily takes longer, assuming such places are available. We also receive late applications which were filled in as much as a year previously so that in some cases even when the papers arrive proper judgements are impossible as the candidates' plans and qualifications may have significantly altered and the information be out of date in other respects.

Commonwealth Academic Staff Scholarships have just the same emoluments and general conditions as the Commonwealth Scholarships, but are differentiated from them by the fact that eligibility is confined to members of staff of universities in the developing countries of the Commonwealth. The nomination of candidates is always initiated by the Vice-Chancellor of the University concerned. The Commission is grateful for the help of the Inter-University Council for Higher Education overseas in consultation with which it makes its selection for academic staff awards. The Fellowships offer the opportunity to overseas universities of enhancing the experience of certain teachers often with a view to making them better qualified to take up appointments at a higher grade; the Scholarships of course provide more orthodox opportunities for higher degree studies.

The Commission continues to make a number of awards for post-graduate training in medicine. Commonwealth Scholars working for a higher professional qualification such as the M.R.C.P. or F.R.C.S. often wish to combine this with an introduction to a clinical speciality. The Primary F.R.C.S. and Part 1 of the M.R.C.P. are both examinations with a fairly high failure rate demanding much of the candidate. Time spent in preparation for these preliminary examinations inevitably reduces the time available for clinical study, and thus often rules out the possibility of any specialist experience. Increasingly it is permissible to sit for such examinations in centres outside the United Kingdom. So, whenever it can, the Commission, in making its awards, gives preference to scholarship candidates who have already passed them.

Medical Fellows and Senior Medical Fellows are selected in March and October. The working of the new procedure whereby Indian candidates are nominated solely by the agency is steadily improving, but the Commission's work of selection would be facilitated if applications arrived at the times requested. Reports gathered from Fellows and supervisors in general reflect satisfaction on the part of both, and it is clear that those Fellows who planned their research projects carefully in advance of their arrival benefited by becoming more closely involved in the work of their host departments than they would otherwise have done.

The Commission's most senior award is the Visiting Professorship. Three such awards were taken up in October 1978. During the year under review 54 nominations were submitted by 29 British Universities for the 1979 awards. It is hoped that five Visiting Professors will come to Britain in 1979.

At the beginning of the 1978-79 academic session, 548 Scholars were holding awards, together with three Visiting Professors, one Senior Medical Fellow, 37 Medical Fellows and 38 Academic Staff Fellows, making a total of 627.

During the period 1 April 1978 to 31 March the following results achieved by its Scholars were reported to the Commission: 97 doctorates, 76 master's degrees, 11 post-graduate diplomas, 12 bachelor's degrees and 10 higher medical qualifications awarded by bodies other than universities. Four Scholars failed

their examinations.

In order to help maintain a direct and personal contact with such a large number of students the Commission continues to organise regional conferences where Commission members can, face to face, talk with award holders and supervisors about their common concerns; thus all involved, students and teachers, are kept informed of the variety of opportunity which the scheme provides. In the year under review two such conferences were held, one for Yorkshire and the North-East (in York) in April and the other for the Midlands (in Birmingham) in November 1978.

The Commission continues to receive much valued help from the British Council in relation to the travel of and payments to the Scholars and Fellows as well as reception, accommodation, welfare matters and the organisation of social events. The services of the British Council were freely available to award holders from its offices and representatives throughout the United Kingdom and were much appreciated by them.

In December 1978 the Commission nominated 69 candidates to 11 countries making awards available to the United Kingdom. These nominees were selected after interview from the 110 candidates short-listed from a total entry of 190 eligible candidates some of whom submitted multiple applications giving a total of 268 applications.

British Virgin Islands

There have been no additions or changes in the machinery set up for the administration of the Plan in the B.V.I.

Brunei

There have been no major changes in the implementation of the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan by the Government of Brunei since 1 April 1978.

Nomination of Government officers for in-service training is made by each Government Department and processed by a Government In-Service Committee before submission to the local Public Service Commission. The tenure of the award depends on the length of the duration of the course taken.

Such in-service study and experience helps the scholars to serve Brunei

more effectively on their return to duty.

No change has taken place in the administration of the Plan in the Falkland Islands.

As a nominating country we attach considerable importance to the availability of scholarships, although we have not been able to make the best use of the Plan because of the requirement for post-graduate study.

We would prefer to see the Plan adapted to support more under-graduate studies and training for professional or technical qualifications.

It is not intended to publish a report on the Plan.

Gibraltar

The Plan works extremely well in Gibraltar. We would, however, like to see the Plan as exclusively a scheme for post-graduate study.

Hong Kong

The Education Department of the Hong Kong Government is responsible for the formation of the Selection Committee, the membership of which, as in previous years, represents a cross-section of higher and secondary education in Hong Kong together with the local representatives of the various Commonwealth Scholarship awarding countries. The Chairman of the Committee is the Head of Chung Chi College, The Chinese University of Hong Kong and the Secretary is an Education Officer of the Education Department. Hong Kong continues to derive much benefit from the Plan and one of the criteria used in selecting nominees for awards is the usefulness and relevance of the proposed research programme to the needs of the Hong Kong community. Competition for the awards is very keen and the quality of applicants continues to be high.

As an awarding country, Hong Kong offers post-graduate scholarships tenable at the two universities. The Education Department of the Hong Kong Government acts as the administrative agency which appoints the Selection Committee and liaises between the Committee members and the two universities in all matters relating to the Hong Kong awards. There are at present seven scholarship holders studying for higher degrees in biochemistry, education, linguistics, physics and engineering. Four awards were made during the period under review.

Extension of tenure of awards beyond two years to enable scholars to study for the PhD degree or for other purposes is considered in each case on

its own merit.

Montserrat

The local operation of the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan has remained the same during the period under review.

Our returns over the past years have shown that our selection process is carefully and thoughtfully done in the light of our manpower needs. Consequently the high rejection rate of our nominees does give us some cause for concern.

Mr. Reuben Meade is presently pursuing an MSc degree in Agricultural Economics in Canada, while Dr. Doris Bramble has returned to Montserrat and is now heading the island's Nutrition Services.

We are very pleased with the services received from Commonwealth scholars so far.

No official report has been written and none is contemplated.

Turks and Caicos

No major changes took place in the operation of the Scholarship and Fellowship Plan in the Turks and Caicos Islands during the period covered since the last report up to the present time. The one student who had been nominated had accepted the award under the Scholarship Plan through which he now pursues a MA post-graduate course in History at London University. No other nomination has been made due to lack of local applicants for post-graduate courses in Britain of the kind available under the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan.

At the present time the Turks and Caicos Islands can only exercise the role of a nominating country under the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan. These islands are unable at this time to become an awarding country due to smallness of size and educational facilities.

CANADA

The Canadian Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Committee continues to be the agency of the Plan in Canada, with its Secretariat being provided by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada.

The Government of Canada, through the Canadian International Development Agency, provided the funds for this Plan. During the year under report the Government increased the basic living allowance to \$350.00 per month with an additional \$125.00 per month being paid in cases where: (a) scholar is studying at the doctoral level, or (b) a scholar is undertaking a second Master's degree, or (c) a scholar has worked for at least one year before taking up the award (compulsory national service does not qualify).

As of September 1 1978, 264 scholars from 39 countries held Commonwealth Scholarships at 30 Canadian Universities. Although the majority of these scholars were at the post-graduate level, under-graduate awards were held by 14 scholars since the programme of studies was not available in the scholar's own country. In addition, during the year under report five Visiting Fellows took up their awards.

In Canada competition continues to be keen for the awards offered by other countries, particularly Australia and the United Kingdom. From reports received, the progress of our Canadians abroad has been most satisfactory and the majority of them have completed the degree for which their awards were offered.

CYPRUS

During the year under review the United Kingdom has made four awards for under-graduate studies: two in Economics, one in Physics and one in Electrical Engineering. New Zealand granted one scholarship for post-graduate studies in Animal Pathology. Hong Kong rejected our candidates. All other commonwealth countries which invited such nominations i.e. Malaysia, Jamaica, India, Malta have not confirmed their awards yet.

During the period covered by the report six candidates completed their studies, three in the United Kingdom, one in India and two in Canada. The United Kingdom scholars gained BSc degrees in Mechanical Engineering and Civil Engineering. The Canadian scholars gained two BSc degrees in Mechanical Engineering and an MSc in Marine Biology. The Indian scholar gained a diploma in Civil Engineering.

Britain has renewed the awards of two scholars up to July 1980 to enable them to complete their BSc degrees in Civil Engineering and Economics/Statistics respectively.

Cyprus continues to offer five scholarships every two years to other Commonwealth countries for specialised studies in Forestry at the Prodromos Forestry College. For the academic year 1978/79 no scholarship was offered.

Cyprus has no institution of University level and, therefore, she is only a nominating country under the Plan. The Scholarship agency continues to be the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The responsible authority for selection of candidates for nomination continues to be the Scholarship Board, Nicosia.

Commonwealth Scholarships are given wide publicity in Cyprus and they attract a large number of applications.

DOMINICA

The Commonwealth of Dominica is not an awarding country.

We have no particular comments on such topics as the length of awards and leave of absence for scholars in Government service. We do not think that the Plan should remain principally a scheme for post-graduate university study for the reason that a substantial number of qualified high school graduates in our country experience difficulty in getting an opportunity to undertake university first degree studies and the additional reason that the existing facilities for providing professional and technical training are severely limited. We would, therefore, welcome provisions for the adaptation of the Plan to our particular circumstances.

The Commonwealth scholars on their return usually exude a high degree of confidence in their ability to make a significant contribution to the development of their country. These scholars usually report that their studies overseas have been of much benefit to them personally and find them relevant to the institution where they work.

No official report on the operation of the Plan in our country for this or any other year has been, or is to be, published.

FIJI

The Scholarship Section has been transferred from the Education Department to the Public Service Commission. The new title and address is:

Since Fiji is a developing country and lacks facilities for degree courses in Engineering, Medicine, Pharmacy, Architecture, Geophysics, Statistics, Forestry and Quantity Surveying there is more need for under-graduate studies and training than post-graduate. The only opening for post-graduates is the University of the South Pacific.

At the moment we are facing problems with the return of not only Commonwealth scholars but also home Government scholars from Australia. A student after graduating as a doctor was granted Australian citizenship easily. On return the Commonwealth scholars have contributed a lot to their employers and also to Fiji. One of the scholars is Head of the Curriculum Development Unit (Education). He has produced three books - "Roots", "Cope" and "Keeping Coping". These books are used in Forms 3-5 in Secondary Schools. Books of this nature produced locally have a great impact on students. They are easily understood.

INDIA

There has been no change in the operation of the scheme and in the terms and conditions of the award.

JAMAICA

The Scholarships Section of the Ministry of Education continued to administer awards of the Plan on behalf of the Jamaican Government.

The major part of the work of this Section, in relation to the Plan, concerns the Section's function as a nominating agency. For the period April 1978 to March 1979 we received invitations for nominations from the United Kingdom, Canada, Malta, Hong Kong, Malaysia, India, New Zealand and Australia. The availability of these awards was announced in the press and as a result ninety-two applications were received. Short-listed applicants were interviewed by panels consisting of Ministry personnel and of representatives of the High Commissions of awarding countries, of the University of the West Indies and of relevant Government bodies. Nominations were made to the United Kingdom, Canada, India, New Zealand and Australia from which we now await decisions.

From the previous year, the United Kingdom and Canada made available five awards which the recipients took up in September 1979 and these were in the fields of Education, Medicine, Library Science and Engineering.

We should like to have more frequent progress reports submitted on scholars, especially for those persons whose courses are longer than one year.

As an awarding country, Jamaica continues to offer one scholarship for post-graduate study. Regrettably, the award made available for the academic year 1979/80 was not taken up by the recipient because of medical reasons and there was no time to make an award to the proxime in time for the beginning of the academic year.

We would be grateful if nominating countries would submit the required documents in support of their candidates' applications as the absence of these makes a proper assessment impossible.

MALTA

The administration, in all aspects, of the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan is entrusted to the Department of Education. A local Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Committee is appointed every year to make recommendations for the submission of nominations for this award.

During the period 1 April 1978-31 March 1979 six new scholarships were awarded to Maltese students under this Plan.

Eleven Maltese scholars were abroad on scholarships during the period 1 April 1978-31 March 1979.

No official report on the operation of the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan is published in Malta.

Under this Plan Malta offers one scholarship to enable a scholar from a country in the Commonwealth to read for a First or Higher Degree at the University of Malta. During the period 1 April 1978-31 March 1979 a student from Cyprus was undergoing a course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science.

Maltese nationals who are awarded Commonwealth Scholarships are required to return to Malta on completion of their studies abroad. These scholars make a valuable contribution towards the continued social and industrial development of this country.

Publicity for these awards is given through Press released and other means of communication i.e. radio, television and the local relay system.

NEW ZEALAND

New Zealand continues to be involved in the Commonwealth Scholarships and Fellowships scheme both as a nominating and as an awarding country.

As a nominating country the scholarships offered by Britain, Canada and Australia continue to attract the cream of our 1st class honours graduates though there is perhaps a tendency for some of these eventually to take up study in the United States of America. More interest is shown in the awards

offered by India but it is still difficult to find anyone interested in other awards offered. Those nominated by New Zealand are usually people who have just completed an honours degree and who have not as yet any work commitments. It is always hoped that they will return to appointments in the universities or in research organisations.

As an awarding country there are still many frustrations. Scholarships are awarded at post-graduate level only and while our information sheet specifies that applicants must be of at least upper second class quality quite a number of those nominated do not have the required grades. Thus a considerable amount of work and hope goes into applications which are not able to be considered. Again with our closing date for receipt of applications as July 31 it is often into September before we have the papers complete. As some of the incomplete applications are those of people who appear to be the most worthy academically, this makes it difficult just to leave those on one side. The result is that it is October before the final selection can be made and this is to be regretted when applicants are eagerly awaiting results. At the present time we have 34 Scholars from 13 countries studying in New Zealand under this scheme.
