APPENDIX II

LIST OF COMMONWEALTH SCHOLARSHIPS, THEIR EMOLUMENTS AND

CONDITIONS OF AWARD

Commonwealth Scholarships are normally intended to cover the scholar's return fares, tuition fees, an allowance for maintenance and books and certain other expenses. All emoluments are subject to periodic review.

The awards are usually open only to persons under 28 years of age (35 as an upper limit) who are Commonwealth citizens or British protected persons and who are resident in Commonwealth countries other than the awarding country. They are tenable at a university or other institution of higher learning in the awarding country and are normally awarded for advanced study or research to graduates or holders of an equivalent qualification. Under certain circumstances an award may be made to enable a student to proceed to a first degree or to a graduate who wishes to undertake further undergraduate study. The normal period of tenure is two academic years, but may be for periods from one to three years depending on the studies undertaken. The conditions and emoluments of each set of awards are determined by the relevant awarding country and are set out below.

AUSTRALIA

Emoluments for Australian Scholarships include:

- 1) Travel to and from Australia generally at excursion rates and by the most direct route. There is no provision for the travel of dependants.
- 2) Payment of all compulsory fees.
- 3) Living allowance, for postgraduate scholars, at the rate of A\$4,620 a year and, for undergraduates, of A\$3,318 a year (out of college) or A\$4,290 (in college or hall of residence).
- 4) Books and equipment allowance of A\$266 a year.
- 5) Fares and travelling allowance for travel within Australia essential to the scholar's study programme.
- 6) Thesis allowance paid in the final year of A\$100 for an undergraduate honours thesis, A\$250 for a master's thesis and A\$400 for a doctoral dissertation.
- 7) Establishment allowance of A\$177 for postgraduates and A\$128 for undergraduates.
- 8) Clothing allowance of A\$196.

9) Marriage allowance at the rate of A\$2,220 for a dependent spouse who is with the scholar in Australia. This allowance is not paid if the spouse holds a scholarship or is in paid employment. It is provided only as a contribution towards the support of a scholar's spouse in Australia. A scholar accompanied by a spouse will need other resources to supplement this allowance.

10) Dependant's allowance at the rate of A\$520 a year for each dependent child with the scholar in Australia, provided the spouse qualifies for the marriage allowance.

BRITAIN

The emoluments are intended to contribute towards expenses of travel, living and study during the tenure of the scholarship and consist of:

- 1) Student concessionary or other approved air fares to Britain and return on expiry of the scholarship (the cost of journeys made before receipt of awards will not normally be reimbursed, nor can fares be paid for a scholar's dependants).
- 2) Approved tuition and examination fees.
- 3) A personal maintenance allowance at the rate of £251 per month
- 4) A grant for books and apparatus of £113 during the first year of study, and of £70 for each complete year of study thereafter; and a grant of up to £100 towards the cost of typing and binding one thesis, where applicable.
- 5) A grant for expenses of approved study travel within Britain of up to £40 per year.
- 6) An initial clothing grant of £128 for such scholars coming from tropical countries as are recommended to receive it.
- 7) For married scholars a marriage allowance of £126 per month is payable provided that husband and wife are residing together at the same address in Britain. It is not paid when the scholar's spouse is also in receipt of an award, or is in paid employment.
- 8) For married couples accompanied by their children, a child allowance is payable at the rate of £16, £13 and £10 per month respectively for the first, second and third child under the age of 16, and provided they are residing with their parents. For a scholar who is a widower/widow or divorced and is legally responsible for the children of the marriage, a child allowance will be payable provided they accompany and reside with him/her.

These emoluments are not subject to United Kingdom income tax.

CANADA

Each scholarship is intended to cover the expenses of travel, living and study during its tenure and includes:

- 1) Transport to Canada and return normally by the most direct economy air passage as arranged by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada.
- 2) Approved tuition and other compulsory university fees (excluding board and residence).
- 3) A basic personal maintenance allowance at the rate of C\$350 per month; a supplementary allowance is provided, the details of which are given to successful candidates.
- 4) A book allowance of C\$200 per year.
- 5) A clothing allowance of C\$350 during the first year of study and C\$250 in each subsequent year.
- 6) In special cases, provision for travel within Canada up to a total of C\$800 if it is an essential part of the scholar's academic programme.
- 7) Approved medical and hospital expenses.
- 8) For a scholar who was married before coming to Canada, a marriage allowance of C\$150 per month while the spouse resides with the scholar in Canada, plus two-thirds of the cost of the spouse's fare to Canada and return as arranged by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada. These payments will be made only if there is adequate assurance that the scholar's spouse will be living with the scholar in Canada for at least six consecutive months of the tenure of a scholarship and provided the spouse does not hold a scholarship or fellowship in Canada. If the spouse wishes to seek paid employment, prior permission must be obtained from the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada, and from the Department of Manpower and Immigration. WE MUST STRESS THAT EMPLOYMENT IS DIFFICULT TO OBTAIN AND PERMISSION TO ACCEPT EMPLOYMENT WOULD ONLY BE GIVEN IF IT DID NOT CONSTITUTE UNWARRANTED USE OF FOREIGN LABOUR, AND DOES NOT DENY THE CANADIAN LABOUR FORCE. If the spouse does obtain employment, there will be a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the marriage allowance during the period of employment - no matter for how short a period of time within each month the spouse is employed.

AS NO CHILD ALLOWANCES ARE PAYABLE TO SCHOLARS, IT IS ESSENTIAL THAT SCHOLARS ACCOMPANIED BY CHILDREN BRING ADEQUATE ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL RESOURCES TO CANADA FOR THEIR SUPPORT.

GHANA

Scholars receive:

- 1) An economy air ticket to and from Ghana.

- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory and examination fees (if applicable).
- 3) Maintenance allowance of £4,800 per year from which the student has to meet expenses in respect of board and lodging.
- 4) Cost of books and apparatus up to £350 per year (if applicable).
- 5) Allowance of £600 per year to cover the cost of travelling within Ghana in connection with the student's studies or research.
- 6) Clothing allowance of £400 for scholars who normally reside in temperate climates.

Scholars will normally be housed in a University Hall of Residence. It is not possible to provide housing for a scholar who is accompanied by his wife. There is, however, no objection to a scholar bringing his wife with him as long as he takes full responsibility for her support and accommodation.

These allowances are not subject to Ghana Income Tax.

HONG KONG

The emoluments cover:

- 1) The scholar's return passage (normally by the most direct economy air passage).
- 2) University fees.
- 3) Maintenance allowance of HK\$2,000 per month.
- 4) Books and apparatus allowance of HK\$400 per year.
- 5) Additional travel allowance of HK\$400 per year.
- 6) Clothing allowance (if necessary) of HK\$640.
- 7) Medical facilities:
 - (i) Normal University Health Service, for the scholar only, provided on the same basis as for all other students in the University.
 - (ii) Free medical treatment in Government hospitals for the scholar and his wife. These facilities do not include hospital maintenance fees, dental and ophthalmic treatment, maternity treatment, nor the cost of any hearing aids or appliances, all of which must be paid for by the scholar and his wife.
- 8) An additional marriage allowance of HK\$1,300 per month will be paid to a male scholar who is married at the time of taking up his award if he is accompanied by his wife. This allowance will not be payable if the wife holds a scholarship or is in paid employment.

The above emoluments are not taxable in Hong Kong.

INDIA (from previous report)

Each scholarship is intended to cover the expenses of travel, living and study during its tenure as follows:

- 1) Cost of air or sea passage from the port of embarkation in the home country by tourist or economy class to the port of disembarkation in India and back and also first-class train or bus fare from the port of disembarkation in India to the place of training in India and back.
- 2) Approved tuition and other compulsory university fees (excluding board and residence).
- 3) A personal maintenance allowance at the rate of Rs400 per month for undergraduate studies and Rs500 per month for postgraduate studies.
- 4) A grant for books or equipment subject to a maximum of Rs300 per year.
- 5) A grant for expenses of approved study tours within India and for attending approved holiday or youth welfare camps at prescribed rates.
- 6) Approved medical expenses.
- 7) An outfit allowance of Rs200 only on joining the institution.

There is no provision for any additional allowance if a scholar brings his family with him.

These payments are not taxable in India.

JAMAICA

The emoluments are intended to cover expenses of travel, living and study during the tenure of the scholarship, and will consist of:

- 1) Fares (normally tourist class air rates) to the West Indies and return on expiry of the scholarship; in the case of a married scholar accompanied by a spouse, half the return passage will be paid in respect of the spouse, provided the duration of the course is more than one academic year.
- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory and examination fees.
- 3) A personal maintenance allowance at the rate of J\$3,300 per year for graduates and J\$2,700 for undergraduates.
- 4) A maximum grant of J\$250 per year for books and apparatus.
- 5) A grant for expenses of approved travel in connection with the course of up to J\$100 per year.
- 6) A clothing allowance of J\$150 for scholars from temperate countries.

7) For a married scholar accompanied by a spouse, a marriage allowance at the rate of J\$800 per year. This allowance will be payable only to scholars who were married at the time of their application and will not be payable in respect of a spouse who holds a scholarship or who is in paid employment.

MALAYSIA

The value of the award has been fixed so that under normal circumstances the maintenance allowance and other benefits will cover the expense of travel, living and study of the scholar during tenure of the scholarship. The following payments will be made:

- 1) Travel to and from Malaysia by tourist class, sea or air by the most direct route as arranged by the Malaysian Liaison Committee. (No provision is included for expenses of dependants except for the wife who is accompanying the scholar).
- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory and examination fees.
- 3) A personal maintenance allowance, payable monthly, at the rate of M\$6,000 per year.
- 4) A grant for books or equipment of M\$150 per year.
- 5) A grant of up to M\$200 per year for approved travel within Malaysia.
- 6) Approved medical hospital expenses with the exception of hearing aids, spectacles and any form of dental treatment.
- 7) An additional marriage allowance at the rate of M\$1,200 per year for a male married scholar accompanied by his wife. The allowance will not be payable during the first year of the tenure of the scholarship unless the scholar was married at the time of his application for an award and will not be payable if the wife herself holds a scholarship or is in paid employment while in Malaysia.

MALTA

The value of the scholarship will include the payment of:

- 1) Fares from and to the country of origin.
- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory and examination fees.
- 3) A subsistence allowance of £M110 per month.
- 4) A book and equipment allowance of £M50 for the whole course.
- 5) Free medical treatment in Government hospitals.
- 6) A marriage allowance of £M30 per month; this allowance will not be paid when the scholar's wife is in employment, nor when the wife does not accompany the scholar to Malta

NEW ZEALAND

The following payments will be made:

- 1) Travel to and from New Zealand by tourist class sea or air passage as arranged by the New Zealand authorities. (No provision has been included for the expenses of dependants.)
- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory, and examination fees.
- 3) A personal maintenance allowance at the rate of NZ\$345 a month from the date of arrival in New Zealand.
- 4) A refund of actual and reasonable expenditure on necessary books up to NZ\$250 a year subject to the books on the list being certified by the scholar's supervisor as necessary for the scholar's course. A scholar may apply, with the support of his supervisor, to use part of this grant for the purchase of a calculator.
- 5) The Scholarships Committee, on the recommendation of the head of the department in which the scholar is working, may make grants in aid of internal travel and field expenses connected with the scholar's programme.
- 6) Assistance with the production of a thesis up to NZ\$500
- 7) Where appropriate, a clothing allowance of up to NZ\$200 - this will apply in the main to scholars coming from tropical countries.
- 8) Medical and hospital expenses with the exception of hearing aids, spectacles and any form of dental treatment.
- 9) Marriage and child allowances provided the spouse neither holds a scholarship nor is in paid employment:

Marriage allowance	NZ\$125 a month
Child allowances	NZ\$6 a week for one child
	NZ\$10 a week for two or more children
- 10) Where a scholar has a spouse and child to support and the spouse has not been able to earn while in New Zealand, the return fare of the spouse at the most economical rate.

The allowances named above are not taxed in New Zealand.

NIGERIA

The scholarship covers expenses of travel, living and study during the tenure of the award and consists of:

- 1) Fares - normally first class sea or tourist air passage to Nigeria and return to the candidate's country of origin on completion of study or research. The cost of journeys made before receipt of an award will not normally be reimbursed.

- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory and examination fees.
- 3) A personal maintenance allowance of ₦2,184 per year.
- 4) A books and apparatus allowance of ₦364.
- 5) An allowance for approved travel in Nigeria for the purpose of study or research, not exceeding ₦280.
- 6) A thesis allowance of ₦140.
- 7) A clothing allowance for scholars from temperate countries of ₦140.

SRI LANKA

The emoluments of the scholarship are as follows:

- 1) Transport to Sri Lanka and return after completion of studies.
- 2) Approved tuition, laboratory and examination fees.
- 3) A monthly stipend paid at the rate of Rs930.
- 4) An allowance for books and apparatus of Rs750.
- 5) An allowance for approved travel of Rs500.
- 6) Free medical treatment.
- 7) The cost of transport of unaccompanied baggage up to a maximum of 20 kilogrammes where necessary.

TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO

The following expenses will be met:

- 1) Passage from the nominating country to Trinidad and back for the scholar as arranged by the Government of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago.
- 2) Tuition and examination fees.
- 3) Any other compulsory university fees (excluding board and residence fees but including refundable deposits such as caution money, which will be paid by and refunded to the Government of Trinidad and Tobago).
- 4) A personal maintenance allowance of TT\$475 per month to cover board and lodging, daily travel and personal expenses.
- 5) A book allowance of TT\$500 per year.
- 6) The cost of approved travelling connected with the course of study in the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago to a maximum of TT\$315 per year. (This is not intended to cover travel from the normal place of residence to the university.)

7) Reasonable hotel charges for a period of one week after arrival in Trinidad (hotel accommodation to be arranged by the Government of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago) to permit the scholar to find suitable accommodation.

8) If the scholar is accompanied by his wife, a wife allowance of TT\$190 per month provided she is not employed.

9) If the scholar is accompanied by his children, allowances of TT\$45 per month for the first child and TT\$40 per month each for the second and the third child. Allowances are not paid for more than three children.

The above allowances are not subject to tax in the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago.

This Register is intended to provide a complete and permanent record for reference purposes of all persons who have held Commonwealth Scholarships in any country. APPENDIX IV

COMMONWEALTH VISITING FELLOWSHIPS AND OTHER SENIOR AWARDS UNDER THE PLAN

1. LIST OF SENIOR AWARDS, THEIR EMOLUMENTS AND CONDITIONS

The following is a statement of the Fellowships and other senior awards available under the Plan. Apart from the Commonwealth Senior Medical Fellowships, Medical Fellowships and Academic Staff Fellowships these awards are not open to direct application by prospective candidates and are normally made by direct invitation from the awarding country to the person concerned.

AUSTRALIA

Visiting Professorships

Description: The awards will enable professors from other Commonwealth countries to be attached to Australian Universities for teaching and research.

Duration: Normally one academic year.

Tenure: Normally at one Australian University.

Value: A grant equal to an economy class return air fare between the Professor's home country and Australia. Other costs are met by the University.

Visiting Fellowships

Description: Persons eminent in various fields of academic specialisation may be invited to accept Australian Visiting Fellowships. The purpose of inviting the Fellows is to enable them to discuss with senior university personnel and educationists subjects of mutual interest and to see something of recent Australian development in their fields.

Duration: Up to three months.

Value: Includes economy class return air fares between the Fellow's own country and Australia, cost of travel within Australia and a maintenance allowance for the period spent in Australia.

BRITAIN

Commonwealth Visiting Professorships

Description: These awards, few in number, are intended for senior scholars of established reputation and achievement in any field including medicine to enable them to visit Britain for research or original work.

Duration: Normally from October for periods of up to one academic year. It is not intended to offer awards for periods of only a few weeks.

Tenure: Normally at the single British university, college or other institution which made the nomination.

Value: Normal emoluments include payment of fare to Britain and return at economy rate and a personal maintenance allowance at a rate comparable with the net salary of a professor of a United Kingdom university. They are normally not subject to income tax in Britain.

Commonwealth Senior Medical Fellowships

Description: The awards are intended primarily to enable senior teachers and in particular those in charge of education to acquaint themselves at first-hand with the facilities available in Britain for the intensive training of their junior teaching staff. They are suitable for Deans and Principals of educational institutions. Full-time professorial departmental heads may also be considered.

Duration: They are held for three months. They are not renewable.

Value: Emoluments comprise air fares to Britain and return at economy excursion or other approved rates and a personal maintenance allowance at the rate of £33 a day. They are not subject to United Kingdom income tax. The cost of journeys made before receipt of awards will not normally be reimbursed, nor can fares be paid for a Fellow's dependants.

Method of Nomination: Nominations will be considered twice yearly in February and October. Completed forms of nomination for consideration in February should reach the Commission's office not later than 31 December and those for consideration in October not later than 31 July. Awards to successful candidates can be expected to begin about six months after selection. Nominations may be made only on the forms issued by the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission. The following are entitled to make nominations:

- (a) the responsible authorities of universities or medical schools in Britain (deans, postgraduate deans and professorial departmental heads) who will be expected to indicate a place of attachment and suggest a programme;
- (b) the Commonwealth Scholarship agency in the candidate's own country.

Direct applications from candidates of whatever country cannot be accepted by the Commission. Moreover, nominations of candidates permanently resident in India will be made solely by the Commonwealth Scholarship agency in their country.

Commonwealth Medical Fellowships

Description: These awards are primarily intended for established medical and dental teachers who have already obtained their postgraduate degrees and qualifications but who require a programme of study in depth to enable them to enhance their teaching experience. Applications solely for clinical study will not be debarred provided that the subject is of educational importance, but preference will be given to those planning to undertake research or to learn research methods. Non-medically qualified teachers engaged wholly or chiefly in teaching medical or dental students can also be considered. There are no formal age limits but selection is usually made from those between 30 and 40 years of age. Fellowship awards are not intended for those aiming at formal qualifications nor is there any provision for Fellows to attend formal courses of instruction.

Duration: They are held for 12 months. They are not renewable.

Tenure: Fellows are usually based on one centre but the study programme may be divided between two if this is appropriate.

Value: The Fellowship emoluments (which are not subject to British income tax) are intended to contribute towards expenses of travel, living and study during tenure of the Fellowship and will consist of:

- (a) approved air fare of a British airline to Britain and return on expiry of the Fellowship (the cost of journeys made before receipt of awards will not normally be reimbursed, nor can fares be paid for a Fellow's dependants);
- (b) personal maintenance allowance at the rate of £358 per month;
- (c) approved laboratory fees (when appropriate);
- (d) a grant for books and apparatus of £113 per year;
- (e) a grant for expenses of approved travel within Britain of up to £40 per year;
- (f) an initial clothing grant of £128 for Fellows on first arrival from tropical countries;
- (g) for married Fellows a marriage allowance of £126 per month is payable provided that the husband and wife are residing together at the same address in Britain. It is not paid when the husband or wife of the Fellow is also in receipt of an award, or is in paid employment.

For married couples accompanied by their children, a child allowance is payable at the rate of £16, £13 and £10 per month respectively for the first, second and third child under the age of 16, and provided they are residing with their parents. For a Fellow who is a widower/widow or divorced and is legally responsible for the children of the marriage, a child allowance will be payable provided they accompany and reside with him/her.

Selection Procedure: Nominations will be considered twice yearly in February and October. Completed forms of nomination for consideration in February should reach the Commission's office not later than 31 December and those for consideration in October not later than 31 July. Awards to successful candidates can be expected to begin about six months after selection. Nominations may be made only on the forms issued by the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission. The following are entitled to make nominations:

- (a) the Vice-Chancellor of the candidate's university or the Principal or Dean of his medical school or college in the overseas Commonwealth country;
- (b) the responsible authorities of universities or medical schools in Britain (deans, postgraduate deans and professorial departmental heads) who will be expected to indicate a place of attachment and suggest a programme;

- (c) the Commonwealth Scholarship agency in the candidate's own country.

Direct applications from candidates of whatever country cannot be accepted by the Commission. Moreover, nominations of candidates permanently resident in India will be made solely by the Commonwealth Scholarship agency in that country.

Commonwealth Academic Staff Fellowships

Description: These awards are primarily intended to enable universities and comparable institutions in the developing countries of the Commonwealth to enhance the experience of their locally born teaching staff in any academic discipline other than medicine, surgery or dentistry. The awards are not intended for study for higher degrees and a candidate should normally already hold a doctorate and have had at least two years' university teaching experience in his own country.

Duration: Normally for one academic year from October to July. The Fellowship is not renewable.

Tenure: Normally at a single British university or comparable institution for a programme of study or training arranged by the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in the United Kingdom to relate closely to the Fellow's work in his own university.

Value: The Fellowship emoluments (which are not subject to British income tax) are intended to contribute towards expenses of travel, living and study during tenure of the award and will consist of:

- (a) approved air fare of a British airline to Britain and return on expiry of the Fellowship (the cost of journeys made before receipt of awards will not normally be reimbursed, nor can fares be paid for a Fellow's dependants);
- (b) personal maintenance allowance at the rate of £342 for each complete month of tenure;
- (c) approved laboratory fees (when appropriate);
- (d) a grant for books and apparatus of £113 per year;
- (e) a grant for expenses of approved travel within Britain of up to £40 per year;
- (f) an initial clothing grant of £128 for Fellows on first arrival from tropical countries;
- (g) for married Fellows a marriage allowance of £126 per month is payable provided that the husband and wife are residing together at the same address in Britain. It is not paid when the husband or wife of the Fellow is also in receipt of an award, or is in paid employment.

For married couples accompanied by their children, a child allowance is payable at the rate of £16, £13 and £10 per month respectively for the first, second and third child under the age of 16, and provided they are residing with their parents. For a Fellow who is a widower/widow or divorced and is legally responsible for the children of the marriage, a child allowance will be payable provided they accompany and reside with him/her.

Selection Procedure: The nomination of candidates to the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in the United Kingdom must be initiated by one of the following authorities:

- (a) the Vice-Chancellor of the university on whose permanent staff he serves in his own country. The heads of Indian universities should send their nominations to the Secretary, University Grants Commission, Bahadur Shah Zafar Marg, New Delhi 1; nominations from the heads of Bangladesh universities should be sent to the Secretary, University Grants Commission, 49 Road No. 3/A Dhanmondi R.A., Dacca 5;
- (b) the Vice-Chancellor of a British university, usually one which has an official link with the university in the candidate's own country on whose permanent staff he serves;
- (c) the Commonwealth Scholarship agency in the nominee's own country.

In addition, the Commission will be willing to consider nominations originating from the heads of autonomous non-university institutions in developing Commonwealth countries.

CANADA

Under the Plan, Canada grants awards known as Canadian Research Fellowships and Canadian Visiting Fellowships.

Canadian Research Fellowships

Description: Canadian Research Fellowships are intended to bring to Canada, from Universities and Research Centres of other countries of the Commonwealth, scholars of established reputation whose presence in Canadian universities is expected to be of benefit to themselves and to their countries as well as to their Canadian hosts. A Fellow will be free to do his own study and research and to engage in other activities for the purpose of building up his contacts with his Canadian colleagues during his study in Canada. He will normally be attached to a single university during the period of his Fellowship, normally one academic year, although the programme might include short visits to other institutions.

Canadian Visiting Fellowships

Description: Canadian Commonwealth Visiting Fellowships are intended to bring to Canada from other countries of the Commonwealth persons who are prominent in any academic discipline or function at universities, colleges, primary or secondary schools, technical institutes or related educational agencies. Visiting Fellows will have the opportunity to discuss various educational matters with Canadian colleagues and to advise and be advised on techniques and problems associated with the particular field of interest.

The visit should be of benefit to the Fellows and their countries as well as to Canada. The programme will be flexible but Fellows will remain attached to the nominating body (institution, organisation or agency) during the tenure of their Fellowships.

The Fellowships are not intended to cover research projects, provision for which is made by Canada in the Research Fellowships described above.

NEW ZEALAND

Prestige Fellowships

Description: The awards are intended to bring to New Zealand a small number of scholars of eminence to give lectures and to hold discussions with university staff and senior students.

Duration: From six to eight weeks.

Value: Emoluments include economy class air travel to and from New Zealand, travel within New Zealand and a maintenance allowance of NZ\$70 per day.

Administrative Awards

Description: The awards are intended for promising young administrators from 25 to 45 years of age.

Duration: Up to three months.

Value: The emoluments include economy class return air fare and travel within New Zealand and a maintenance allowance of NZ\$50 per day.
