**John Connell** is Professor of Geography, in the School of Geosciences, University of Sydney. He previously worked at the Institute of Development Studies (University of Sussex) and the Australian National University. He has been a consultant for various international and Pacific regional organisations. His research focuses on rural development, migration and remittances in the Pacific, with particular reference to health workers and potential 'environmental migrants'. He has written more than 20 books, including *Papua New Guinea. The Struggle for Development; Urbanisation in the Island Pacific. Towards Sustainable Development* (with J. Lea) and *Islands at Risk: Environments, Economies and Contemporary Change*.
