AUSTRIA

UNITED NATIONS COMMISSION ON INTERNATIONAL TRADE LAW (UNCITRAL)

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

UNCITRAL has a mandate to train and assist lawyers, law teachers and governments officials, particularly from developing countries in various aspects of international trade law and practice. Therefore, UNCITRAL has organized 2 seminars on international trade law in conjunction with annual sessions of the Commission. Since 1981, the Commission has also sponsored seminars on a regional basis, often with other organizations.

As well, the Commission has a practice of taking on young lawyers as interns for several months. The subsistence cost of these interns have been borne by Governments or other organizations. UNCITRAL provides office and library facilities in their Secretariat and associates the interns with on-going projects.

FRANCE

EUROPEAN COURT OF HUMAN RIGHTS

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

The European Court of Human Rights does not conduct formal courses or tuition. However, the registry of the Court occasionally receives individual trainees for periods of upto 3 months. For reasons of confidentiality, they are not directly involved in the principal work of the Court, namely the drafting of judgments and are generally asked to assist by preparing indexes for certain of the court's publications.

Trainees are also received for shorter periods, i.e. one week, in which time they have the opportunity of acquainting themselves in a general way with the court's activities and, possibly, of attending some of its hearings.

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE OF HUMANITARIAN LAW

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION:

The International Institute of Humanitarian Law, founded in 1970, has as its purpose the development, promotion and dissemination of international humanitarian law as well as the development and promotion of human rights and of refugee law.

Since 1974, the Institute has held, annually, "Round Tables on Current Problems of International Humanitarian Law". The Institute also organizes other meetings, often held elsewhere than Sanremo, Italy.

For example, 2 conferences are offered in 1983:

- (1) Courses on International Refugee Law (under the auspices of the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees).
- (2) Courses on Law of War for Officers - Teaching embraces both the law governing the conduct of hostilities and the law for the protection of combatants and civilians.

LENGTH AND DATES OF COURSES:

- (1) Nov. 27 - Dec. 9 1983. Course held annually for 2 weeks.
- (2) Oct. 16 - Oct. 28 1983. One to two courses held each year for 2 weeks.

LOCATION OF COURSES:

Villa Nobel, Sanremo, Italy.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

- (1) Invitations are sent to governments particularly involved in refugee problems. Participants should be Government Officials who are directly involved in refugee matters in different ministries, i.e. at ministerial level.
- (2) All governments (ministers of defence) are invited to designate officers for participation. Courses are mainly intended for high ranking officers with authority to ensure proper training and respect of law within the AFs general staff and special staff officers. Members of the medical and judge advocate corps and legal advisers in a limited number are also welcome.

LANGUAGE:

- (1) English/French (with simultaneous translation)
- (2) English (occasionally, French and Italian).

TUITION FEE:

- (1) None
- (2) \$(US) 300.

INTERNATIONAL OCEAN INSTITUTE: (IOI)

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

Training Programme in the Management and Conservation of Marine Resources.

Since 1980, the I.O.I. has offered interdisciplinary courses combining law, economics, science and technology in the following areas: Ocean Mining, Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) Management and Regional Ocean Management. The courses have been designed for mid-career civil servants from Third World countries although they are not limited to this.

LENGTH AND DATES OF COURSES:

Four courses are offered each year at different times throughout the year. Each course runs 10 weeks.

LOCATION OF COURSES:

Courses take place in different parts of the world. For example, in 1983 courses are being held in Malta and F.R. of Germany, Halifax, Canada, Viti Levu Fiji and El Djezair, Algeria.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

Nomination of candidates must be endorsed by appropriate Government departments or national or regional organizations. Candidates require a B.A. or equivalent and preferably at least 2 years experience in related work.

INTAKE PER COURSE:

20-24 participants. No restrictions on nationality of candidates except not more than 2 from any one country.

LANGUAGE OF TUITION:

English usually and occasionally a course in French.

TUITION FEE:

(1983) US\$7500.

THE HAGUE ACADEMY OF INTERNATIONAL LAW

For many years, the Hague Academy of International Law has invited prominent authorities in the field of International Law to teach a course at their summer school. The summer school is divided into 2 sessions: Public International Law and Private International Law. The 1982 programme indicates the type of topics covered:

International Adoption

PUBLIC INTERNATIONAL LAW

New Problems concerning International Juridical Personality
The Place of Law and its Limits in the International Commercial System
Problems of Ethnic, Racial and Religious Minorities in the United Nations.

The Academy invites candidates who already possess some advanced knowledge of International Law to sit for oral and written examinations leading to a Diploma. Candidates may try the exams in either French or English.

LENGTH AND DATE OF COURSES:

Each Course runs 3 weeks in July or August.

LOCATION OF COURSES:

The Hague, Netherlands

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

Only those who have studied law for at least three years will be admitted to the courses, with the exception of those who have an international experience acceptable to the Academy. Persons interested should apply preferably between the end of January and the beginning of June.

A certain number of scholarships are available each year for candidates. Applications plus supporting documents must reach the Secretariat of the Academy by March 1st.

INTAKE PER COURSE:

Private International Law - 144 students approx.

Public International Law - 285 students approx.

LANGUAGE OF TUITION:

English or French. The majority of courses provide simultaneous translation.

TUITION FEE:

Registration at The Hague is subject to the payment of a fee of 50 florins for a period of 3 weeks or 75 florins for a period of 6 weeks payable after arrival.

The Academy can arrange for accommodation in a private house at a modest fee.

SWITZERLAND

INTERNATIONAL AIR TRANSPORT ASSOCIATION (IATA)

In 1981, IATA established an IATA Training Advisory Board to organise a range of management and non-management courses using the facilities of Member Airlines' universities and other well-established training institutions. The Board has already developed the basic framework for an airline training programme with special emphasis being directed towards the overall training needs of airlines in developing countries. Two such courses have taken place annually conducted by Air Canada and McGill University with considerable input from IATA.

The course, entitled "Professional Aviation Management" lasts 4 weeks, is held at McGill University and in 1983 cost \$(C)3,300 exclusive of travel and living costs. As well as concentrating on key issues facing senior managers in the international aviation community, the course is also designed to give government officials and airport administrators a clear understanding of the issues involved in airline management.

A similar course organized by IAL and IATA took place in June/July 1983 in Bath, England. Fee for the 3 week course was £1,650 inclusive of food and accommodation. Also, as part of IATA's Programme for Developing Nations' Airlines, a number of seminars and workshops have been held or are planned to broaden Members' knowledge in a range of activities. These include Airport Development Training, Security, Fraud Prevention and Traffic Forecasting. Further projects include developing training programmes along the most practical and economic lines for airlines in developing countries and exploring the potential for establishing regional airline training centres, especially in Africa.

COMMONWEALTH FUND FOR TECHNICAL CO-OPERATION (CFTC)

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

Legislative Drafting Courses

Since 1974, the CFTC has organized courses which provide trainees with a good grounding in the basic principles, techniques and practices of drafting legislation. The courses cover the following areas:

- (a) The use of language in legislation; the importance of correct syntax;
- (b) Different methods of drafting including advantages and disadvantages of the textual method of amendment;
- (c) The importance of legislation of general application;
- (d) Relevant principles of interpretation;
- (e) Constitutional considerations - Federal systems; impact of Fundamental Freedom provisions;
- (f) Preliminaries to drafting - mastering the subject matter; critical examination of instructions; request for further instructions; necessity for adequate time;
- (g) The process of composition;
- (h) Progress of the draft; explanation of draft to and discussion of draft with 'client';
- (i) Matters for particular attention e.g. applicability of received law; relationship of common law, customary law and statute law; pitfalls and bad habits to be avoided;
- (j) Special forms of drafting e.g. Constitutions; Subordinate legislation, etc.
- (k) The draftsman's responsibility to and relationship with Parliament, Ministers, other Law Officers; Government Departments; the Courts; the legal profession and the public.

Depending on need and the availability of resources it is intended to introduce from 1984 a 'master's' course to be run jointly with the basic course but for a smaller group (3-4 persons) and for a shorter period (3-3½ months). Admission will be restricted to serving draftsmen with a minimum of about 5 years experience.

LENGTH OF COURSE:

5 months to 6½ months.

LOCATION OF COURSES:

Regional courses have been held at the following centres: Kingston (Jamaica), Accra (Ghana), Nairobi (Kenya), New Delhi (India), Port of Spain (Trinidad and Tobago), Lagos (Nigeria), Colombo (Sri Lanka), Christchurch (Barbados).
Courses are currently holding in Colombo and Nairobi.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

Trainees must be nominated by their governments usually through the Attorney-General, Law Ministry etc. No specific qualification is required but trainees will usually have a law degree and/or professional qualification or some drafting experience.

INTAKE PER COURSE: 10-15

LANGUAGE OF TUITION: English

TUITION FEES:

None. The course is fully funded by the CFTC.

CROWN AGENTS TRAINING SERVICES

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

Commercial Law for Lawyers in the Public Service

This course for legal advisers in government departments, ministries, public corporations and other bodies in the public sectors, aims to develop further skills in dealing with suppliers, contractors and consultants.

The course features sessions on negotiation, drafting, legal analysis and techniques of advising. More formal seminars in the law relating to the international sale of goods, agency investment and finance, tort, conflict of laws, European Communities Law and Comparative Company Law will be held. Leading practitioners will instruct the group on insurance law matters, the settlement of disputes and trademark and patent law.

LENGTH AND DATE OF COURSES:

The course is held on an annual basis and runs for five weeks.

LOCATION OF COURSES:

Trinity College, Cambridge

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

Candidates tend to be nominated by Governments of Commonwealth and other developing countries or by the state or nationalised industries of these countries. A law degree and fluency in English will be assumed. Ideally, participants will have had 2 to 5 years practical experience.

INTAKE PER COURSE:

Maximum 20 participants

TUITION FEE:

(1983) £2750. The fee covers accommodation and food for the duration of the course, all tuition, course materials and transport to course visits. Increases are kept to a minimum. So far, all course participants have been funded by their government or department.

COURSE FOR GOVERNMENT LEGAL ADVISERS:

The course provides training in international law, the drafting of legislation and treaties and other subjects of public law of importance to legal advisers to Governments. Emphasis is placed on training of a practical nature, and from a contemporary view point. Visits are paid to the Law Courts, Parliament, Oxford, Cambridge, the International Court of Justice at the Hague, and the Hague Conference on Private International Law.

The Institute of Advanced Legal Studies manage the course on behalf of the Overseas Development Administration of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

LENGTH AND DATE OF COURSES:

The course is held annually for 14 weeks and begins in March.

LOCATION OF COURSES:

Institute of Advanced Legal Studies, London, England.

Candidates should be barristers or solicitors or have an equivalent qualification or a degree in law, have had some practical experience and intend to follow a career in Government Service.

UNITED STATES

AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION: INTERNATIONAL LEGAL EXCHANGE (ILEX)

Since 1969, the ABA has operated an exchange visitor programme. The programme is designed to enhance American lawyers' understanding of judicial procedures and legal practices and to acquaint foreign attorneys and judges with the U.S. Court System and legal practices.

As well as arranging trips and placements for U.S. lawyers and judges abroad, the ILEX programme provides the following services to foreign lawyers.

1. Travel and survey seminars

ILEX will arrange with a foreign government bar association or legal organization for a group of lawyers from a foreign nation to study particular areas of U.S. jurisprudence. Every effort is made to insure the participants are exposed to the widest possible range of people - inside and outside the U.S. legal profession. All substantive programmes and travel arrangements will be made by ILEX if requested.

2. Individual placement of foreign lawyers in U.S. law firms or office

The programme processes requests from foreign individual lawyers who wish to receive training with U.S. law firms or in other legal offices. The Programme has been approved as a designated agency by the U.S. International Communications Agency for the purpose of certifying the eligibility of foreign visitors for exchange status under the J-1 Visa. ILEX follows up the arrangement to ascertain whether it is progressing satisfactorily and requests a final report from the foreign attorney.

3. United Nations or Government Sponsored Foreign Visitors

The ILEX Committee will provide programme and visitation assistance to individuals who visit the UN on grants from the UN, Department of State or foreign governments. These are normally lawyers or judges who come to the U.S. on a programme to study a specific area of the law and usually travel to several cities or regions. ILEX makes arrangements for them for meetings with lawyers, judges, law related agencies and other organizations.

Nominal placement fees for individuals and for group tours provide self-financing support for the Programme. Participants are accepted on a financially self-supporting basis, responsible for their own travel and maintenance.

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION:

The International Peace Academy organizes intensive training seminars on an annual basis. For example, two seminars were planned for 1982:

LENGTH OF COURSES:

UNITED NATIONS INSTITUTE FOR TRAINING AND RESEARCH (UNITAR)

TITLE AND DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

UN/UNITAR International Law Fellowship Programme in International Law

This programme is designed for developing countries to enable qualified persons, in particular, middle-grade government officials and young university teachers of international law, to acquire and update their knowledge of international law and of the legal work of the United Nations and its associated bodies.

Six weeks of lectures and seminars in public and private international law is followed by 3 months of practical training at one of the Legal Offices in the United Nations System where candidates pursue research on a topic of their choice.

LENGTH OF COURSES:

The Hague, Netherlands and wherever appropriate U.N. legal office is located.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

Candidates should have a law degree and prior legal experience.

INTAKE PER COURSE:

A minimum of 15-18 candidates are selected yearly depending on budgetary considerations.
